(that is, charitable gift) for the one who establishes justice among people." (Bukhārī)

So as you read on in this issue of Al-Hilal, pay attention to the suggestions our young writers put forth for achieving peace, justice and fairness, and improve health, economy, education, and resource efficiency, and reduce pollution in the world. Many of their solutions embody the principle of justice and the treating of one another as "kin to kin." May Allah guide these writers so they can put their solutions into practice and create a more harmonious world. Āmīn.



The Story of Wild Camels


It is said that the tribes living in Mecca and the territories around, tired of unending blood-feuds, resolved to found an association the purpose of which was to help victims of aggressive and unjust treatment. When the Holy Prophet (may peace and blessings of Allah be upon him) heard of this, he gladly joined. Members of this association gave an undertaking in the following terms:

They will help those who were oppressed and will restore them their rights, as long as the last drop of water remained in the sea. And if they do not do so, they will compensate the victims out of their own belongings (Sīrat Ibni Hishām by Imām Suhailī).

It seems that no other member of this association was ever called upon to discharge the undertaking solemnly entered into by members of this association. But opportunity came to the Holy Prophet (may peace and blessings of Allah be upon him) when he had announced his Mission. His worst enemy was Abū Jahl, a chief of Mecca. He preached social boycott and public humiliation of the Prophet (may peace and blessings of Allah be upon him). About that time a person from outside came to Mecca. Money was due to him from Abū Jahl, but Abū Jahl refused to pay. He mentioned this to people in Mecca. Some young men, out of sheer mischief, suggested that he should approach the Prophet (may peace and blessings of Allah be upon him). They thought that the Prophet (may peace and blessings of Allah be upon him) would refuse to do anything for fear of the general opposition to him and particularly for fear of the opposition of Abū Jahl. If he refused to help this man, he would be said to have broken his pledge to the association. If, on the other hand, he did not refuse and chose to approach Abū Jahl for the



restitution of this loan, Abū Jahl was certain to turn him away with contempt. This man went to the Prophet (may peace and blessings of Allah be upon him) and complained to him about Abū Jahl. The Prophet (may peace and blessings of Allah be upon him), hesitating not a minute, stood up, went with the man and knocked at Abū Jahl's door. Abū Jahl came out and saw that his creditor was standing with the Prophet (may peace and blessings of Allah be upon him). The Prophet (may peace and blessings of Allah be upon him) mentioned the loan and suggested its payment. Abū Jahl was taken aback and, making no excuses, paid at once. When the other chiefs of Mecca heard of this they reproved Abū Jahl, telling him how weak and self-contradictory he had proved. He preached the social boycott of the Prophet (may peace and blessings of Allah be upon him), yet he himself accepted direction from the Prophet (may peace and blessings of Allah be upon him) and paid a loan on his suggestion. In selfdefense, Abū Jahl pleaded that any other person would have done the same. He told them that as he saw the Prophet (may peace and blessings of Allah be upon him) standing at his door, he also saw two wild camels standing one on each side, ready to attack. We cannot say what this experience was. Was it a miraculous appearance designed to upset Abū Jahl or was it the awe-inspiring presence of the Prophet (may peace and blessings of Allah be upon him) which produced this hallucination? A man hated and oppressed by a whole town had taken the courage to go alone to the leader of that town and demand the restitution of a loan. Maybe this very unexpected sight frightened Abū Jahl and for a moment made him forget what he had sworn to do against the Prophet (may peace and blessings of Allah be upon him), and forced him to do as the Prophet (may peace and blessings of Allah be upon him) suggested (Hishām). 

Everyone should take care of mosques in the same way as they look after their homes, if not better.








Allah Looks into Our Hearts

The human heart as we know it is a muscular organ which pumps blood back and forth in our body, making our physical existence possible. However, it is much more than that. It also feeds our spiritual growth. We refer to our heart when we describe our soul, mind, and spirit.

Our heart is the seat of all human emotions and true beliefs. The place where no matter what we say or do, our true intentions lie. Allah can see these true intentions, good or bad. So, it is important that we act accordingly because, if we say or do something we do not actually believe in, it is seen as a very big sin in Allah's eyes.

Today I am going to talk to you about how Allah looks into our hearts. The title of my article is based on a beautiful Ḥadīth of our beloved Holy Prophet (may peace and blessings of Allah be upon him):

Innallāhā Lā Yanzuru Ilā Şuvarikum Wa lā Ilā Ajsāmikum Wa Lākin Yanzuru Ilā Qulūbikum. God does not see the physical features of your body, but He sees your hearts.

Men and women are obsessed with appearance. There is nothing wrong with grooming and personal hygiene but it is undeniably true that many people are only concerned with their exterior beauty. People then start to neglect the inner beauty that they should have. But Allah does not look at our physical features; He looks only at our hearts which contain the truth about a person that one could not even begin to know from their physical features.

We human beings try to guess the conditions of others from their faces or other physical features because we cannot read their hearts. In many cases our guesses turn out to be wrong. But God, being our Creator, knows the conditions and intentions of our hearts. We cannot hide anything from Him and we should try to keep our hearts clean. In any case, we cannot deceive our God.

The same subject has been mentioned by our Holy Prophet (may peace and blessings of Allah be upon him) in another Hadīth in which he said:

Innamal-A'mālu Bin-Niyyāt.
Our actions depend on our intentions.

This means that Allah shall not reward according to our outwardly, good-looking actions but according to the real intentions behind them. Our intentions belong to our hearts and those are only known to God. So a sincere Muslim would always examine his heart to see if his motives are honest, and if the heart is presentable to Allah, the Almighty.

Zakariya Virk writes in one of his articles that a healthy heart will undoubtedly keep a mind healthy and vice versa. A person's character is built on his thoughts, in other words, we are what we think. Allah, our Merciful Lord, through His Benevolence, has given us the choice and power to govern our thoughts and thereby build a character that is worthy of praise. An immoral character grows from the seeds of immoral thoughts while a virtuous character grows from the seeds of virtuous thoughts. The heart is where all kinds of good or bad thoughts are born. Therefore, it is imperative to cultivate a pure and clean heart.

The Prophet of Islam (may peace and blessings of Allah be upon him) has also described the importance of a pure and sincere heart. According to the most reliable book of Hadīth, Bukhari, he told one of his companions:

In the body there is a piece of flesh; when it is healthy, the whole body is healthy, and when it becomes unhealthy, the whole body is unhealthy, and lo, that piece is the heart.

This Hadīth indicates that a human heart is the



fountainhead of all our emotions. If one's heart entertains pure thoughts then all of one's deeds will be upon the road to virtue, but if one's heart is full of wicked ideas, then that would lead him to a path of vice. Of all the sins, man can fall into, none of them seem as sinful as false profession and hypocrisy. God has termed them as Munāfiqīn, that is, hypocrites, whose actions are not supported by their hearts. Not only do hypocrites not keep their word or talk of sincerity, but also have disbelief in their hearts.

The Promised Messiah (may peace be upon him) has very rightly warned all of us,

Daro yāro woh beenā khudā he. O people, entertain fear of God in your minds as your God is the All Seeing One. In this age, the Promised Messiah (may peace be upon him) has revived the living faith in God and repeatedly advised us to practice Taqwa, meaning, righteousness. This is helpful to get rid of hypocrisy and follow the commandments of Allah, the Almighty.

Thus the heart is like a plant, which starts with a seed but it develops into a tree. Similarly, the thoughts and ideas are born in the heart, which then grow into actions that shape who we are. A good root embedded in the heart ultimately results in better hands, tongue, eyes and mind. Consequently the purity of heart encourages the growth of the tree of virtue. responded with peace

Instead of benefiting from the last days of the holy month of Ramadan, a mob ransacked, looted, and set fire to 8 Ahmadi homes in Gujranwala, Pakistan on July 27. A grandmother and her granddaughters, a 7 year-old and 8 month-old baby, died of suffocation; a 7 month pregnant female suffered a miscarriage, and 8 others are being treated for injuries and burns. What's worse, the police, even with reinforcements, did nothing to stop the mob.

The fire brigade was obstructed and forced to turn around and ambulances were pelted with stones by the mob. These innocent people were killed because they were members of Ahmadiyya Muslim Community. The second amendment to the Pakistani constitution prohibits Ahmadis from associating in any way with Islam and Ordinance XX goes on to



criminalize all such actions. Thus, the Aḥmadiyya Muslim Community faces state-facilitated and institutionalized persecution. His Holiness, the Khalīfa of Islam, Mirza Masroor Ahmad, has always forbidden Ahmadis from taking to the streets or responding with

aggression. He has, instead, urged community members to respond with patience and prayer.

Condemning terror


Dear Editor:

Would you like to have a job where you get to learn about new things every day, talk to interesting people and figure out creative ways to tell stories that enthrall and captivate your audience? Become a journalist.



Journalism is a vital profession in society. Journalists report news and other important information to the

public. Sometimes they explain complicated subjects. Other times, they write about new trends or scientific breakthroughs. They do this by collecting information on people, events and issues. Sometimes they travel to the site of a story, like an accident or an important gathering. But they also interview people to get more information, research public records and make their own observations.

Some journalists work for newspapers, while others write for magazines or web sites. Other journalists work on television or in radio. There are many ways to get the news out to the public, and many journalists often have to be able to shoot video, take pictures and write clearly at the same time.

Most journalists specialize in certain subject areas, called "beats." For example, a political journalist might focus her reporting on what's going on in Congress, while a sports reporter might work solely on writing about basketball. Specializing in a specific subject area allows the journalist to



become knowledgeable in the subject and develop contacts and research.

The skills you need to be a journalist include being able to ask smart and tough questions, conduct research, write well, and put together information from multiple sources to tell a clear story. It's a tough job, but it can also be a lot of fun. You're often the first to know about something, and you get to shape how a story is told. As a journalist, you get to talk to people from all parts of society, and you are always learning something new.

But being a journalist also carries a lot of responsibility. Journalists must be able to report multiple sides of a story in a fair way. They have to be able to figure out what the truth is in many situations. And often, they are required to hold people in positions of power accountable for what they do. And journalists must work hard to verify everything they report and write and make sure it is as accurate as possible.

Sometimes, journalism can be a dangerous job. For example, if a journalist is writing about a controversial subject or a dangerous situation, he or she could face obstacles in reporting the story that may even include threats to his or her safety. That's why we should be grateful to journalists who write about atrocities happening in the world, because they often have to take risks to uncover the information they bring to the world.




